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


Figure 1, Intusoft's New SpiceNet schematic entry program makes SPICE easier to use than ever before. And best of all, IT'S FREE!


### ICAP™Links with OrCAD, Protel, and Viewlogic

Intusoft is proud to announce that the wait for seamless integration of SPICE 3 based simulation with your schematic capture package is over! Intusoft has introduced a new series of products called *ICAP*<sup>™</sup> for OrCAD<sup>®</sup>, *ICAP*<sup>™</sup> for Protel<sup>®</sup>, and *ICAP*<sup>™</sup> for Viewlogic<sup>®</sup>. The new systems use Object Linking and Embedding (OLE) technology to transparently integrate a complete set of analog and mixed signal capabilities into the OrCAD Capture <sup>TM</sup>, Protel Schematic<sup>3™</sup>, and Viewlogic Workview Office <sup>TM</sup> schematic environments.

The old integration methodology connected simulators to your schematic via a netlist as shown in Figure 2. OLE allows the integration between two programs to take place at a much more sophisticated level even though the programs may come from different vendors. Indeed, many of your favorite programs (Excel, Word) use this paradigm to interconnect different software modules developed by the same vendor.

The benefits of getting all your tools from a single vendor are greatly over stated and largely inaccurate. Because of the nature of the software development process and the expertise required to develop even a single EDA tool, the best tools in each class are not available from a single vendor. Fortunately, in today's software environments, different applications can be just as integrated as a single application.

The *ICAP*<sup>™</sup> software eliminates the restrictive netlist interface of the past and replaces it with new features that make it easy to perform circuit simulation. For example, SPICE model editing, custom SPICE attribute dialogs for each element, special dialogs for SPICE analysis statements, waveform and operating point cross-probing, and the ability to launch and control the



simulator from the schematic (Figure 2) are all directly accessible from within your schematic environment.






Figure 4, An IntuScope graph generated by the Alter dialog. This curve family was automatically created by sweeping a bias source and monitoring a node voltage. You can sweep virtually any parameter and plot any voltage. current or power dissipation.

Two new and extremely powerful features are the automated parameter sweeping action and the **ICAP™** Analysis Wizard. For example, in Figure 3, an "Alter" dialog is added to Capture. It is accessed through a new menu function (Alter Selected Component) in the Accessories menu. You can choose to sweep any part value or the circuit temperature. A list, linear range, or logarithmic range of values can be swept. When the Run button is pushed, all the simulations run automatically and a curve family is displayed in the IntuScope program (Figure 4). Performing "What-If" studies has never been easier.




Figure 7, Entry of SPICE analysis statements is greatly eased by the new Simulation Setup dialogs.

The Accessories menu also provides access to a new IsSpice4 Simulation Controls dialog (see Figure 7). The dialog makes it easy to specify the analyses you want to run. For beginners, an even easier method is provided; an Analysis Wizard. Shown in Figure 5, the Analysis Wizard leads you through a series of dialogs and prompts you for data along the way. When finished, your answers are converted into the proper SPICE syntax.

*ICAP*<sup>™</sup> includes the *IsSpice4* native mixed mode (analog/digital) circuit simulator, SPICE *Model Libraries* with over 9000 analog and digital parts, the *IntuScope* graphical waveform analyzer, the *SpiceMod* SPICE modeling program, and a set of symbol libraries. These features are all integrated directly into your schematic. No netlist editing and virtually no knowledge of arcane SPICE syntax is needed anymore.

#### Price And Availability

ICAP™ for OrCAD is available immediately. The Protel and Viewlogic version release dates will be announced in the next newsletter. The price of *ICAP™*, (for OrCAD, Protel, or Viewlogic), is \$2995. Each *ICAP™* package is available in two versions. The **RF Designer's version** has a special SPICE library for RF parts, while the **Power Supply Designer's version** has a special SPICE library for power electronic parts. **This is the only difference.** Owners of Intusoft's current (version 7.6 or greater) ICAP/4Windows software can add any *ICAP™* package for \$495 each.



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### **Intusoft Releases New Schematic Version**


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The new SpiceNet program is designed to make SPICE easier to use than ever before, while still providing a wealth of uncompromising features for the power user. Many new features have been added, including several that are not available in any other schematic package.

The most significant change is to the SPICE attribute dialogs. A custom "properties" dialog is included for every element. Figure 6 shows the BJT properties dialog. Through it you can manipulate every aspect of the SPICE transistor model including instance and model parameters. **No knowledge of SPICE syntax is necessary**. You can even edit SPICE subcircuit netlists and model parameters directly in the schematic. SpiceNet is smart enough to create a new model instance onthe-fly if you change any parameters.

A new SPICE analysis setup feature is provided (Figure 7). It contains a series of fill-in-the-blank dialogs for each IsSpice4 analysis. Again, the need to remember complex SPICE syntax is eliminated. You can even set up and choose from different sets of analysis statements.

SpiceNet contains improved support for mixed mode circuits, part tolerances, and Monte Carlo analysis. There is also a new feature for defining part failure modes. A custom part sweeping

They provide easy access to all of IsSpice4's powerful analysis capabilities.



dialog completely automates the generation of curve families (Figure 3). The difficulties associated with SPICE signal generator syntax are handled in the schematic with new stimulus dialogs.

While SpiceNet is directed primarily toward driving analog and mixed signal simulation, it provides virtually all common schematic editing functions. For example, SpiceNet supports full concurrent multipage, multidesign editing. You can even split the screen to obtain multiple views of the schematic. The revised symbol editor is now interactive and contains many unique features. For instance, you can import artwork via the clipboard and utilize Windows meta-files and bitmap images in symbols to create superior looking schematics. Embedded OLE objects, like MS Word equations and documents and Excel spreadsheets can be placed directly into SpiceNet.

Another powerful new feature is the ability to handle mixedtechnology or complex electrical designs via a multilayer structure. Schematic objects can be mixed on various layers to create various simulation scenarios. Users can specify which layers to view, edit, print simulate and combine into separate "Configurations" (Figure 8). This allows different levels of complexity and connectivity to be easily manipulated.

Several new features are included to empower ASIC and System designers. For ASIC designers, there is support for parameter passing, equation based generic modeling, and symbol substitution. For system designers, there is support for custom C code subroutines including OLE dialog generation and symbol generation from within user defined DLLs, plus complete support for equation based blocks.

The specialized support for IsSpice4 and its numerous SPICE extensions, plus its interactive display features, are what separates SpiceNet from other schematic programs.

### Why Is Intusoft Distributing SpiceNet For Free?

The Internet marketing model has shown that giving away good products can have positive results. For the EDA world, this is a significant departure from the try-before-buy limited demo marketing approach. It is Intusoft's aim to provide the best-inclass simulation tools no matter what schematic tool you are using. We hope to get more people to buy our simulation tools by seeing how easy it is to run SPICE. Distributing SpiceNet helps us do that. Once convinced of the benefits of simulation, you can either purchase IsSpice4 and use SpiceNet or utilize ICAP<sup>TM</sup> to link IsSpice4 to another schematic entry system.

### What's FREE And What Do You Pay For?

SpiceNet is included in new ICAP/4Windows version 8.0. An upgrade to v8.0 from any previous 7.5x version is \$495 and includes the first 8.x update. ICAP/4Windows 8.0 is available after December 16, 1996. The ICAP/4 update includes SpiceNet v8.0, a new ICAPS menu shell interface, enhanced parameter sweeping and cross-probing, enhanced SPICE model libraries, new Library Manager utility, improved Monte Carlo analysis, new Batch Mode multi-simulation interface, a basic analog and mixed signal fault analysis capability, and interfaces to the new Design Validator™ and Test Designer™ options. If you have purchased ICAP/4Windows after September 15, 1996 the upgrade to version 8.0 is free.

### Design Validator™, New Technology Supporting Validation and Test Set Design

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
...can't buy the parasitic parts that were included in the simulation and the technician can't locate the SPICE pulse generator for the device under test. For each major test configuration, the design engineer needs to generate a new schematic. Design changes must then be copied back into each version of the schematic to validate the design integrity.

With SpiceNet 8.0 Intusoft provides powerful new features that not only solve these problems, but also enable the circuit designer to have **validation test suites** and provide the framework for **automatic test set software design**.

SpiceNet divides the schematic into layers and configurations (Figure 8). Each configuration is composed of a combination of layers. For example, the core circuitry could be on one layer (called "main circuitry") and the SPICE generators and test circuitry on a second layer (called "spice stuff"). A third layer could contain the PWB interface (called "PWB interface"). Then we could have 2 configurations (called "production" and "Spice Test") as shown in the following table:

Moreover, you could have any number of layers and configurations to test various aspects of your design; for example, you could add feedback circuitry to check out closed loop performance or data processing circuitry for mixing or demodulation.




Design Validator™ allows each configuration to be combined with a set of IsSpice4 analysis settings. The IsSpice4 settings direct the type of simulation (AC, Transient). The combination of analyses and a configuration is referred to as a "Test". Each test is assigned one or more measurements (Figure 9). Design Validator™ returns the measurement results to the schematic after running the tests, where the results are organized into reports. The reports contain the measurement limits which are used to grade the circuit performance. The table below illustrates the pairings of analyses and measurements with a configuration in order to define a test.

Simply put, **Design Validator**<sup>™</sup> keeps track of multiple circuit configurations, analysis setups and measurements. It then **runs the entire suite of tests automatically**. Finally, **Design Validator**<sup>™</sup> creates a report that summarizes the pass-fail grades and lists the results in a report which is similar to Figure 10. This powerful capability extends SPICE well beyond its current single simulation oriented boundaries. The price of the **Design Validator**<sup>™</sup> option is \$995. It requires ICAP/4 version 8.0. It will be available January 20, 1996.

In our next newsletter, we will show you the new IsSpice4 measurement capabilities and introduce our new Test Designer™ software which extends the **Design Validator**™ concepts deep into the Test Software Development arena.



## Visual Basic Scripting With IsSPICE4

OLE provides a common framework through which programs from one or more vendors can communicate, and a common foundation in which programmers can work. In its simplest form, OLE is a technology that allows one program, an OLE Controller, to take advantage of services provided by another program, an OLE Server. The computing features and functions exposed by the OLE Server are called OLE objects. An OLE interface essentially allows two programs to share functionality without having to know about one another.

IsSpice4 supports two types of OLE enhancements. The first is that IsSpice4 is an OLE Server. This means that any OLE Controller can "drive" the simulator. For example, a math program, like MATLAB, could use IsSpice4 as a simulation engine and ask it to run an analysis and pass back the results so that they can be used in a subsequent MATLAB calculation.

Secondly, IsSpice exposes an Interactive Command Language (ICL) as an accessible set of OLE objects. ICL is a scripting language that contains a wide variety of simulation related functions such as analysis commands and functions that change part values.

A simple "script", or macro, to run 2 simulations would be:

view tran v(3); display V(3) as the simulation runs tran 1n 200n; run a transient analysis for 200ns

print v(3) ; send the data for V(3) to the OLE Controller alter @r1[resistance] = @r1[resistance] \*1.10; increment R1 10% tran 2n 300n ; run another longer transient analysis for 300ns print v(3) ; send the data for V(3) to the OLE Controller

The ICL is a publicly available protocol enhanced by Intusoft to interface external applications to the IsSpice4 simulator. It exposes all of the interactive functionality of IsSpice4. With OLE, the ICL interface is distilled into a form that makes it easy to access all of the capabilities of SPICE. Additional OLE interfaces to control the IntuScope post processor and to implement schematic cross-probing features can also be obtained from the IsSpice4 OLE interface.

In order to demonstrate IsSpice4's OLE interface, we will use a Visual Basic (VB) Script (Figure 11) to start IsSpice4 and remotely run Transient and Fourier analyses. In this case, the script is run from the Microsoft Excel spreadsheet program. The simulation uses values taken from the spreadsheet. The IsSpice4 results are returned to the spreadsheet.



The SPICE.DoScript command sends ICL functions to IsSpice4. Several ICL statements can be concatenated into one DoScript or sent individually. In the above VB script, 3 transient simulations are run. For each analysis the value of the resistor (RF) is set based on the Excel spreadsheet (column A, rows 2:4) values using the strAlter= line. The total harmonic distortion results of a Fourier analysis are returned in SPICE.ScriptOutput and displayed in column B, rows 2:4. Many other more complex applications are possible.

IsSpice4 is the ONLY SPICE simulator to offer OLE and Visual Basic interfaces. It is just another way in which Intusoft distinguishes itself from other EDA tool vendors.

Figure 12, A Visual Basic script, shown in Figure 11, is used to interface an Excel spreadsheet with IsSpice4. The spreadsheet shows the value of resistor RF and the resulting harmonic distortion of the amplifier circuit (inset). The VB script passes the RF values, runs the simulation, and returns the results. A graph of the THD is also shown.



## **Mixed Mode Modeling: Digital Pots**


Intusoft is the ONLY SPICE vendor that makes SPICE models FREE of charge for its registered users. Many of the models shown in the newsletter were motivated by such requests. It is an extremely valuable service that really distinguishes Intusoft from the competition. Some of the requested models are simple, while others require a great deal of research.

Recently, Intusoft's technical support was asked to model the Xicor X931x digital potentiometer line (Figure 13). The X931x, and similar X9C10x line, are solid-state nonvolatile potentiometers that are ideal for digitally controlled resistance trimming. They use digital circuitry to control a series of electronic switches that connect to a resistor array. It turned out to be an interesting modeling task, especially in light of the model's mixed mode nature.

#### **Model Workings**

The resistor ladder is emulated by 2 voltage controlled resistors, Rtop and Rbot (Figures 13 & 14). Their values are controlled by a voltage, Vpos, equal to the output of the Bdtoa element in the Analog\_State subcircuit. Rtot is the total resistance and TAPS is the total number of taps. The 1U is used to keep the resistance from being set to 0 when the wiper hits its limits. SPICE does not allow resistors to have a zero value; instead it sets them to 1ký.

A state machine (Astate line in Analog\_State) model, unique to Intusoft's IsSpice4 program, is used to model the digital logic of the memory, up/down counter, and the one-of-100 decoder. The state machine transitions to the previous or next state depending on the status of Vup/dn when Vinc transitions low.






Its output is used to keep track of the wiper position. The 7 bits of the state machine are weighted and summed in the Bdtoa behavioral element as the voltage Vout (=Vpos).

The first and last states (0 and 99) are set up so that the output can not move below 0 or above 99. A  $\sim$  in front of a node number inverts the digital signal. The AtoD and DtoA bridge elements connect the analog and digital signals. They convert between continuous time voltages and discrete digital states.

The only functions not modeled are the ability to move the wiper several positions (shorting out several resistor taps) before the Wiper is finally set, the full Chip Select operation, and the power on/off operation. The model changes on each clock pulse. To force the model to change state at another interval (T), set clk\_delay=T in the d\_state model in Analog\_State. The \*DE-





FINE /Vinit=0 in the Analog\_State subcircuit defines the initial state of the potentiometer as well as the potentiometer state when Reset goes low.

Two example circuits are shown. In Figure 15, the digital potentiometer is used to vary the bias current, and hence the gain, of a transconductance amplifier. In Figure 16, a variable frequency Wien bridge oscillator is investigated.


